

and the Alps in pursuit of Chamois; he had taken an active part in politics; he was sociable and generous. Although he made a point of keeping in touch with innovations of every kind, he was curiously conservative in some respects; he changed his style of dress very little, and he was never seen driving a car. He set himself high standards in all he did, and will be remembered for the way in which he lived up to them, whether as the successful man of business, the Henley Steward carrying out his duties with methodical efficiency, the gracious host in the elegant Chelsea flat, or the friend and helper of all who shared his dedication to rowing. It was typical of him that he was still engaged in correspondence on rowing matters right up to the end of his life. The week he died, he wrote to the Captain, in the letter quoted elsewhere in this journal: "My thoughts often turn to the Thames Rowing Club, and the immense pleasure which I have derived, from time to time, from being connected with its activities."

We remember him with very real affection.

PY the time these thoughts appear in print much of the winter training will have been completed. This was begun with some of the probable 1st and 2nd VIII oarsmen being entered for the Head of the River fours followed by participation in the early long distance sculling races. It was hoped in this way to combine the advantages of small boating with added variety to the winter programme particularly for those who had had only a short break from a long and strenuous previous season.

We had a fleet of some twenty scullers most of whom competed at Weybridge, the Head of the Cam or Marlow. The last two events unfortunately clashed and but for dividing our force we would probably have added to our success at Weybridge where we won the team prize. Six individual sculling pennants were won.

This seemed a good prelude to the remainder of the winter programme designed to give a good basic mileage in eights combined with further small boat activity. Those who were not sculling and some newcomers had been looked at by the coaches during the early weeks then from mid-October to the Plum Pudding Race crews were organised as 'A'. 'B', a Junior Eight and a crew consisting mainly of mature senior oarsmen who would not be available for summer rowing together with some less

experienced oarsmen to benefit from their company.

It was hoped that with some promising and relatively experienced juniors about that a good Junior Eight would develop though it was realised that some of the juniors would be candidates for the more senior crews. In the event we did not have the numbers to ensure a really regular crew and after Christmas it seemed better to combine some juniors with some junior-seniors to form a 3rd VIII most of whom could be considered possible challengers for a place in the 2nd VIII. Selection for the 2nd VIII had given some problems but more changes in the 2nd and 3rd VIII's arose from absences for business, sickness or less excusable reasons and lack of stability and fixed order of rowing delayed progress. Unpunctuality, outing or a training session missed harms not only the individual's chances of success but those of a crew.

Nothing succeeds like success and this sometimes leads to the slavish copying of style or methods of winning crews but their inward and invisible virtues are missed. Catchphrases can deceive, gimmickry may often tempt and coaches like to oversimplify. In reality winning results from a number of complementary factors but if one requisite comes before all others I believe it is singleness of purpose. Skill, strength and fit-

ness, confidence all thrive on one another and with due singleness of purpose can be acquired and the buffets and discouragements can be resisted.

Of the quest for Olympic Gold Medals Ian Fairbairn wrote in a letter to me a few days before he died:

"All I can say the way thereto is by devoting all ones energies to the job. 'Show me a first class oarsman and I will show you a first class lunatic' my father used to say. It means of course that you have got to forsake all other pleasures in a way which seems ment-

ally deficient to the normally minded. But I verily believe the joy to be derived therefrom surpasses anything the normally minded have ever experienced".

Last year's Captain wrote in the Journal "A club's immediate aim ought to be to win at regattas up and down the river in all classes of event. If it succeeds in doing this the top honours will come in due course". I agree and believe that we have the material to achieve this immediate aim and more if we have the singleness of purpose.

# CAPTAIN'S REPORT 1968.

IT would be idle to pretend that 1968 was one of the great seasons for Thames, but it was certainly rather better than many recent years; and that, at least, in a step in the right direction.

The previous year's racing had not been very successful, and at the beginning of winter training in October I felt that many of our oarsmen had developed a rather fatalistic, though happily not fatal, attitude towards Thames rowing. There seemed to be a general acceptance that we could not beat the big guns, and as a result there was an underlying feeling that we would have to be content with second class wins.

This approach has always been contrary to my nature and was certainly contrary to that of our crews five or ten years ago. Our Commonwealth Games eight of 1958, for instance, which contained some relatively immature oarsmen, would never have won selection had it sat down and weighed up the probabilities. The same is true of several other of our representative crews of the period.

But circumstances have changed in ten years, and with the regular appearance of university and composite crews at Henley, it is becoming increasingly unrealistic to try to repeat our David attitude in the face of the more numerous, and more powerful, Goliaths lying in wait in the senior events.

The simple truth is that at the beginning of 1968 we did not have the material to challenge the top crews; and some of our physically stronger men were either weak in other ways or simply lacked the incentive to train hard enough — an inevitable consequence, I suppose, of a lack of confidence in their own abilities. As a result, I felt all along that we must keep a flexible senior squad which could find its proper level in various classes of boat before deciding what to aim for at Henley. with the strongest possible junior squad to back them up and to try to get the club winning again at junior and intermediate level.

In the end, I was satisfied with the outcome. Starting with some individual and team sculling wins in the autumn, and a win in January by the Juniors, which was a great boost to their morale, we finished the season with over 30 wins; and over 30 oarsmen shared in these successes at nearly every level, though since we did not race the first eight seriously in the summer, we had no grand wins.

In addition to this, we would almost certainly have recorded our first Henley win for some years in the new Henley Prize had our four not been unlucky enough to draw the 'wrong' station in the final, becoming yet another victim of the torrential stream on that disastrous Saturday.

In the pre-regatta period, the first eight raced for the Boustead Cup against London for the first time in several years and lost after apparently having the race sewn up at the halfway mark; but although this damaged the crew's morale at the time, it did expose both mental weaknesses and lack of physical fitness in some members of the crew who had looked like being key men. We soon had our revenge in the Reading and Tideway Heads, defeating London on both occasions and rising to more respectable positions once again; but it was always clear that the eight's potential was limited, and in the early regattas we concentrated on fours, pairs and sculls, At first we did not entirely abandon the eight but trained almost entirely in small boats. The eight raced three times and reached the final each time, winning the Dashes in a surprisingly good row (to me at any rate). At Staines, they gave London University a good run for their money before succumbing over the second half of the course. In the heat they beat the Molesey eight which had won the Elite event at Ostend.

But we knew it was only a question of time before the small boats became our main line of attack. The question was whether to row a Stewards four, or a coxed four for the Henley Prize and a Wyfold four; and the early regattas were used to test the opposition. Both fours had early successes and eventually had six wins apiece in the fours as well as individual wins in other boats. The heavier, more experienced crew ultimately became the coxed four, and despite an unhappy patch up to Marlow always looked to have a good chance of winning at Henley. The lighter four also became victims of the torrent at Henley, losing to a crew they had thrashed not long before.

If we were unsuccessful at Henley, the rest of the season provided plenty of satisfaction. A win in the Senior Pairs at Ghent early in the season was a good morale booster; and a win at Wallingford, after only three outings, by the Wyfold four which contained the

pair was another tremendous fillip. This win involved the defeat of both the Oxford fours, one of which had earlier won the Elite Fours at Ghent, and it gave our crew the confidence it needed at exactly the right moment.

The full record will be found elsewhere in this Journal, so there is no need to go into any more detail, but my grateful thanks go to Felix Badcock, who so patiently coached, cajoled and encouraged the coxed four, and to Bill Williams, who helped with the Wyfold four.

The Juniors, under the avuncular guidance of Alan Reddin, showed promise right from the start. Their long, rather slow stroke, which served them well in the winter by giving them an early Junior win, beating London in the Boustead, and taking them almost to a Junior Pennant in the Tideway Head, prevented their early success in the spring, when more lively, higher rating crews showed to better advantage.

However, after some narrow defeats, they won their second trophy at Thames Ditton and eventually merged with the second eight to form a Henley eight. This was a very raw crew, but I felt that Henley experience would serve them well, and I am sure they will all reap the benefit in due course.

Later in the summer, wins in Senior-Junior pairs and fours filled in what is often an unwelcome gap in our collection of silverware.

The Club was again represented in the National Youth Championships, this time by a pair from UCS who, although unable to repeat our 1967 success, were runners-up; and one of, N.M.L. Aitchison, from the 1967 four, went as spare man to the FISA Junior Championships in Amsterdam.

Finally, a word of thanks to John Stephenson and Stuart Miskin, both of whom gave invaluable coaching assistance, and to the launch drivers who turned up in all sorts of weather to perform their essential but often thankless task.

# **CLUB FUNDS**

# A MESSAGE FROM THE CAPTAIN

Young oarsmen are seldom affluent and equipment is expensive. The early minute books of the Club record an overdraft. The problems of finance are not new but with the present day cost of a racing eight and a set of blades amounting to some £800 there is small reason for complacency.

Since the Tideway Trust has no longer been available to help balance the budget our income has not covered expenditure. Some raising of subscriptions was inevitable last year and further thought is being given to the organising of some form of draw to provide more income. Careful administration and prudent economy will, we hope, arrest any widening of the gap but there are sometimes unforeseen contingencies. Earlier this season the hot water supply boiler had unexpectedly and urgently to be replaced at an expenditure of £250. Donations from members and the efforts of some other members in organising dances have raised nearly £200 of this.

We want Thames representative crews to have first class modern equipment and to defer replacing boats and equipment can be a false economy since 1st. VIII equipment is in due course required for 2nd and 3rd crews and so on down. Help for the Boat Fund is always welcome.

Present and constant needs have somehow to be met but it has long been felt that the Club should try at the same time to build some long term capital fund with safeguards on expenditure and that a trust fund would enable contributors to feel that they were investing in the future well-being of the Club, that all donations should not and could not be immediately disbursed. The Thames Trust has been long in gestation. We have those willing to act as trustees, though alas they cannot now serve under the chairmanship of Ian Fairbairn. It is hoped that

the Trust Fund will be an accomplished fact in the coming months. The fund will be quite separate from the normal Club accounts and inviolate without the trustees' consent. Some money has already been received and placed in a separate bank account. Further support will be very welcome even before the Trust Fund is formalised.

# OLYMPIC GAMES — MEXICO 1968 By J. D. Cazes

Those of us who were in Tokyo for the 1964 Olympic Games were most impressed by the organisation, and we left Japan wondering how the Mexican Games would compare four years later. In the event, most people were pleasantly surprised. It is true that planning was deficient or even non-existent in some points of detail — no programmes were available, for instance, for the first day's rowing, and the medical services were occasionally not all they should have been - but, by and large, the Games were well and efficiently run. The new Xochimolco course is one of the finest in the world and, so far as could be seen, absolutely fair. Any wind seems always to be dead ahead — at least in October—and as it never varies in the first part of the day in the vicinity of Mexico City, good weather was assured for the regatta by holding all the racing in the mornings. If a criticism is to be made of the course it is that it is not deep enough. FISA rules require a minimum depth of 2 metres, and the actual depth is 2.13 metres. At 7500 feet altitude, the strong tropical sunlight penetrates right down to the bottom, and weeds are abundant and fast growing; and, indeed, they gave some trouble before the opening of the Games. But that is a small point, and all the competitors were appreciative of the course, with its impressive mountain scenery. Boat houses, office buildings and stands were all very good; and the competitors had a better stand than they get at most regattas.

For British spectators the results were disappointing. The University of London eight never raced like medallists; and on the final day Kenneth Dwan was unable to reproduce the form he had previously shown, which might have earned him a medal.

For the impartial spectator, the highlight of the rowing was the performance of the New Zealand team. From the first race their coxed four rowed like medallists, and they were never led in any of their races. In the eights their spectacular win in the first heat immediately made them favourites for the event; and it was interesting to see how many people looked forward to the overthrow of the giants, East and West Germany and the USSR, by a small nation. It may well have been the psychological burden of sudden fame and the carrying of the good wishes of so many that was too much for them. Whatever the cause, they found the pace in the final too hot, and finished fourth after leading over the first half of the course. The race was made memorable by the tremendous finishing spurt of the Australians, who moved up from fifth place to second over the last part of the course and might well have won if there had been another 100 yards to go.

Apart from the eights, one of the best races was the final of the double sculls, with the USSR snatching a win from Holland in the last few strokes. It would have been interesting had the very effective Brazilian double been able to compete in this race; but unfortunately they had a poor outing in the semi-final and were thus relegated to the small finals, which they won with ease after a poor start. They might well have won a medal had they got into the final proper.

Much has been said and written, both before the Games and after, about the effect of high altitude. One has the strong impression that oarsmen suffered more from the height than other athletes. Strong solar radiation or reflection from the water may have been partly responsible; and it is true that after the second day, by which time most oarsmen had been persuaded to wear hats when on the water, the casualty rate was noticeably lower. Nevertheless the area in front of the

boathouses was as littered with recumbent bodies as a battlefield after the eights; and it was some time before the winners' ceremony could proceed. Perhaps the saddest collapse was that of Martin Studach, so that he and Melchior Buergin were deprived of their chance of ending their last season with an Olympic win.

We found much to interest us in Mexico apart from the Games. The sight seeing was limited but most of us managed to see something of the natural beauty of the country. The visit to Acapulco was inevitable — and like going into a steam bath after the crisp mountain air of Mexico City. We saw the pyramids of Tlotihuacan, Tula, and, of course, the capital itself. We bring away a memory of the genuinely warm and friendly welcome of everyone in Mexico.

# **OBITUARY**

We regret to record the deaths of the following members. Ken Marsh joined the Club in 1963 and died last May. We were indebted to him during the last few years for printing this Journal, and for his help in organising some of the Club's later draws or sweepstakes. His assistance with the Journal was invaluable.

The Hon. Mr. Justice Horace S. Palmer represented St. John's College, Oxford, at Henley. He was a Judge of the High Court of Nigeria until his fairly recent retirement.

E. Westbury will be remembered by those members who were rowing in the 1930s as a sculler.

Harold Rickett a former Chairman of Henley Royal Regatta, President of the ARA and of Leander Club, was a valued member of TRC for many years. His recent and apparently sudden death is a great loss to rowing generally; and though he did not visit us at Putney very often, we welcomed him when he did find time to come, and looked forward to those days when he wore the Club tie at Henley.

# HENLEY ROYAL REGATTA 10th. 11th. 12th. 13th July

Storms and floodwater upset the smooth running of the regatta. The floodstream built up throughout Thursday with times for the course rising in proportion. They were formed very soon after the Thames Hare and Hounds and celebrate their Centenary this year.

Among their founders was F. H. Reed. He took a very large part in the promotion of the Club and, indeed, remained one of its guiding lights for very many years. Not very much is known about him, as he was very reticent and did not talk about himself: but we know that he was a member of Thames R.C. He was proposed for membership on the 23rd February, 1869, and was elected at a general meeting in March of that year. He was sponsored for membership by his brother, H. M. Reed, and seconded by E. H. Scovell. H. M. Reed took a fairly prominent part in the life of the Club in the 1860s and 1870s, and rowed for us on a number of occasions, though he did not represent us at Henley. But there is no note in the Club's records about F.H's rowing; and it may be that he turned to running almost immediately. By April 1870, he had become Honorary Secretary of the Peckham Amateur Athletic Club — the original name of the Blackheath Harriers — and he gave a lifetime's devotion to them. At the time Blackheath Harriers were formed, the Reeds lived in Bermondsey, and their father had business interests in the London Docks nearby. The Peckham Club was founded by a number of his neighbours in Bermondsey. F. H. Reed was 19 when he joined Thames R.C.

In recent years Thames R.C. has often taken part in cross country matches organised by Blackheath Harriers; and they have always proved very enjoyable. We offer our congratulations to the Club on its Centenary and our best wishes to it for its future success.

# EYRE CLUB

Until the early 1920s the Stewards of Henley Royal Regatta accepted more than one entry from a Club in races at the regatta, but since then they have barred multiple entries in all races except the Silver Goblets, the Double Sculls and the Diamond Sculls. The one exception to this rule in recent years occurred in 1956, when a temporary rule inspired by the forthcoming Olympic Games allowed us to race two fours in the Stewards. Our grounds for wanting to race both were that we did not know which was the faster, and, indeed, could not find out before the regatta, as there was no opportunity corresponding to a Henley race which we could use. The usual and familiar Henley coincidence in the draw caused the two fours to race each other in the first round; and our contention was amply borne out by the result. The crews were so close in speed that Porter's four beat Macmillan's by only 3 feet, and then went on to win the event.

There is no sign that the Stewards will alter their rule about multiple entries, and some Clubs are finding it hard in some years to enter all the members at the regatta they could wish. Accordingly steps have been taken to ease the position for us in the future by promoting a new Club in whose name we can make alternative entries. This Club has been registered with the ARA under the name 'Eyre Club'. Under the Henley and ARA rules it must be open to all if our object is to be attained; but its Captain is the Captain of Thames R.C., it is firmly under the control of senior members of the Club, and its entries at regattas are in the hands of the Captain. For administrative reasons it is necessary for all its members to be Associate Members of the ARA, but this is no hardship in these days when most rowing men have this qualification, and the others can easily obtain it with advantage to their Club.

It will be possible for the Eyre Club to make entries in al this year's regattas except Henley, and at Henley in 1970 and after.

# REMENHAM CLUB

Remenham Club was founded in 1909 to provide a convenient place for members of the leading Rowing Clubs to meet during Henley Regatta. It was founded by London, Thames, Vesta, Twickenham, Kingston, Molesey and Staines, and membership is limited to those who have represented one of these Clubs at certain Regattas and to a few who have rendered a signal service to their Club.

Thames R.C. took a very prominent part in the founding of Remenham Club and is very happy in the knowledge that H. E. Greenwood, Vice-President and President Designate of Thames, is also President of Remenham Club.

The Club celebrates its 60th anniversary this year with a Dinner held in the new bathouse of Kingston Rowing Club, and by extending the Club premises at Remenham Lane on the Regatta course. This extension has nearly doubled the space inside the Club. The new extension will be formally opened on the 22nd June on the occasion of a Sherry Party which is to be held at the Club on that date. All members will be most welcome on that occasion.

Last year Remenham Club held a dance for the first time on the last Saturday of Henley Royal Regatta. This proved most successful and there will again be a dance this year on July 5th. The Club looks forward to its great success.

Of the founding Clubs, Thames has the largest number of members on the roll of Remenham Club, and it will be very happy to keep this position of preeminence.
